
## JOINING THE CHURCH — LIKE PULLING TEETH



## TWO FREESTANDING STEEPLES

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There are some interesting links between two important Baptist churches located on different ends of Montevallo Road. Mountain Brook Baptist Church is located on Montevallo Road South. Sixth Avenue Baptist Church is located on Montevallo Road Southwest (now known as Martin Luther King Boulevard). While Mountain Brook Baptist Church is celebrating its 75th anniversary, Sixth Avenue can trace its history back 138 years to 1881, when Birmingham was young. Mountain Brook Baptist Church's building sits on its second site, and Sixth Avenue also occupies its second site.

In May 1961, Mountain Brook Baptist Church welcomed Dr. Dotson M. Nelson Jr. as pastor. In August 1962, Dr. John Porter was installed by Martin Luther King Jr. as pastor of Sixth Avenue Baptist Church. In the 1960s, Birmingham was at the center of civil rights struggles. To help with Christian reconciliation in this volatile time, these two young leaders in town became friends. Each spoke up for advancement of human rights.

Mountain Brook Baptist Church was spared direct confrontations from the Birmingham protests, although our neighbor Mountain Brook Junior High was closed on several occasions due to bomb threats.

At the time, Sixth Avenue Baptist Church was located on Sixth Avenue South at Sixteenth Street. The historic church and its community of members were being displaced by rapid growth of UAB's campus. Mountain Brook Baptist Church was making crucial decisions about a new Sanctuary building. We began building in 1965 and the Sanctuary was occupied on Easter 1967. About the same time, Sixth Avenue Baptist Church bought 12 acres on Montevallo Road Southwest, near Elmwood Cemetery. They sold their old building to UAB.

Both congregations faced lots of internal discussion about design of their future buildings. Some of our membership took time to accept some of the less conventional design elements of our Sanctuary. Some referred to the front of the building as having "wings" and others couldn't appreciate a freestanding steeple with the entrance underneath.

Sixth Avenue Baptists were accustomed to a beautiful traditional building, but on a new campus they could consider innovation. Why not try a freestanding steeple?

Dr. Nelson invited Dr. Porter to bring his congregation to visit Mountain Brook Baptist Church and see firsthand the beauty and style of our freestanding steeple. One Sunday, Dr. Porter loaded a bus with his members to visit and worship in our Sanctuary. The final decision: Sixth Avenue Baptist Church built their campus with a freestanding steeple and occupied it on March 3, 1970.

Through the years, two freestanding steeples—each adorned with a cross but located on different ends of Montevallo Road—have continued to bridge the racial divide through Baptist conventions and conversations.
